Exploring Mission Trips at The Community Church

Many of us have experienced the wonderful fulfillment of participating in a faith-based mission trip. Some of us have been on the receiving end of these benevolent excursions. Are mission trips something that CCTV could successfully plan and complete? Could they become a routine part of our mission giving to the community? Could these ventures be fulfilled locally? Nationally? Internationally? Based on discussions among our members, these are all questions worth exploring.

What would these missions look like? Please allow me to share a personal story that impacted me greatly. The story took place on September 12, 2001. The location was the South Parking Lot of The Pentagon in Washington, DC. The now infamous attack had occurred about 23 hours earlier. I was walking between the Army Operations Center and the hastily constructed morgue that we set up near the “now defunct” Pentagon Helipad in the parking lot. After surviving the destruction of our office, I had been assigned to oversee the morgue and provide an interface between the FBI and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. With no sleep in over 36 hours, I was walking with my head down through South Parking. A woman’s voice, and the gentle hand of a man interrupted my deep thoughts. “Colonel,” the voice said, “can we offer you a cup of soup?” “No, thank you,” I instinctively answered. “Save it for the first responders.” She continued, “how about a pair of clean socks?” I looked around at the trailer and tent that they had erected in amazement. “Who are you?” I asked. The gentleman answered with the name of their church and pointed to their sign. I read it and asked when they left their town in North Carolina. He answered that they departed within 6 hours of the attack on the Pentagon. Some of their volunteers were driving all night to catch up. I looked around...looked into their eyes...so hopeful...took in what I saw...and began to cry. They hugged me, together, hiding my embarrassment, until I regained my composure.

Within 20 hours of hearing about the attack, this tiny church: 1) perceived a need, 2) gained approval to deploy, 3) loaded some remaining supplies into their pre-positioned disaster trailer, 4) drove 7 hours north to the Pentagon, 5) convinced the guards to gain entrance to the support area, and 6) set up their tent and cooked soup. I was dumbfounded! This tiny church in North Carolina beat the Red Cross, the military units, and every other disaster team by hours. They were first! And they cared...Oh, did they care!! Incredible...and all in the name of Christ!!!

We are not suggesting that we form a disaster response unit at CCTV, but what might be appropriate for us? We are a church so wonderfully filled with deep and various talents from all walks of life and from around the world and nation. Can we put these talents to use in forming mission fulfillment? Should this plan be locally focused, domestically focused, or internationally focused? Or should it be a combination of all? Maybe we could start small by sponsoring mission trips that are already being planned?

If your response to this article is positive, please plan to meet with me for an exploratory session in March. Please watch for the date.

Both have been community volunteers all along. Peg taught church school and vacation bible school, and sang in choirs for many years. She was a Girl Scout Leader, hospital volunteer, and currently serves in the STAYinTV Drive Assist program as well as the church choir.

Walt has volunteered in Jaycees, Junior Achievement, and served as a Boy Scouts Assistant District Commissioner. He served on and often chaired hospital, community foundation (founding chairman) and church boards and committees. Summary
Tellico Village Community Church Council Meeting Minutes
February 16, 2017

Council Members present: Bonnie Carter, Vice Chair, Jim Decker, Missions, Jim Fella, Trustees, Shauna Oden, Finance, Joe Tedesco, Worship and Music, Pastors John Orr, Devin Phillips, and Steve Prevatte.

The meeting lacked a quorum.

The January Financial Analysis Report is in comparison with the 2016 budget rather than 2017 due to our not having a budget yet this year.

The stewardship campaign was successful and there is follow-up with those who made comments on the pledge cards.

The proposed budget discussion was limited to changes since the last review. It is considered a conservative budget based upon the needs of each team. Discussion followed.

Council set the annual meeting to the congregation for Sunday March, 26 following the second service.

Trustee Report - The exterior of the CLC will be painted as soon as the weather allows. The ceiling of the Fellowship Hall has been painted.

The trustees also accepted the donation of a grand piano.

The trustees took action regarding the medical equipment loan closet. To relieve the church of any liability, there will be a release form for those borrowing equipment.

Mission Team Report – Jim Decker reported that Ken Thoreson has resigned from the mission team to serve on the outreach team.

Worship and Music Team – The team also discussed questions regarding the Wednesday evening activities; i.e., services and small groups. The team deferred to the pastors for them to discuss at their off-site planning meeting.

April 23 is the date set for the appreciation luncheon for the greeters/ushers/communion stewards/lay readers. There will be training included to help standardize procedures.

Pastors' Reports

Pastors were asked to talk about their experiences and vision relating to their specific areas of responsibilities.

Steve Prevatte feels that CCTV should have hands-on missions as well as financial support for such. We should be the type of church that answers the call for special missions. Discussion followed about having a fund that will support mission work. The council affirmed to start a fund to meet such a need.

Devin Phillips reported that he works with the trustees and with outreach. In outreach, the focus is on public relations with a new presence at the New Villagers meetings. Devin recognizes that there is no place to “exercise a spiritual muscle for serving” in our community. It is hoped that the small groups will meet this. The ministers are looking at starting a group for grandparents living in the village who are now parenting grandchildren.

Devin believes that the church needs a vision of who we are and what we do. He asked participation of the church leadership to attend the Church Leaders Conference being held in May in Dallas.

John Orr’s vision supports the idea of mission-related opportunities; and ways to make retirement matter.

Other – The next new members’ luncheon is March 19 and will include all who have joined in the last eighteen months. The purpose of the luncheon is to engage new members in ways to get involved. Team leaders are encouraged to attend to help answer questions.

The next scheduled council meeting is Thursday, March 16 at 2:00 in the fireside room.

Community Church January 2017 Financial Update

Summary:

With the start of the new year your church leadership teams are busy finalizing the 2017 budget for presentation to the congregation. Please note that until there is an approved 2017 budget, the 2016 budget will be used for financial statement comparison purposes as shown below.

Revenues are high due to increased pledges and several members paying their entire-year pledge in one payment. Many of these members took advantage of the IRA Required Minimum Distribution IRS ruling to make these payments. The expense overruns in Operations and Personnel were due to the timing of payments for insurance that apply to the entire year.

Cash increased with the surplus this month and the Debt Reduction Fund increased slightly. Additional payments will be made to reduce the mortgage as funds are accumulated in this account.

If you are over 70-1/2...DID YOU KNOW?

Sometimes there are benefits of getting older. If you are over the age of 70 1/2, you can make a charitable contribution directly to CCTV from your IRA. This contribution counts toward your Required Minimum Distribution for the year and is **not taxed**. By doing this, you cannot itemize your contribution for income tax purposes (that would be double dipping). Contact your financial institution that has your IRA to get the appropriate paperwork.

Mission Ministries

GOOD SHEPARD CENTER

The Good Shepard Center, located in Madisonville, is a 501(c)(3) organization that works to combat hunger in Monroe County. We receive no state or federal funds and serve over 2,000 people a month. We are blessed with a staff of two part-time employees, a workforce of 87 volunteers providing 8860 hours of service in 2016 and a volunteer board comprised of religious leaders and lay people.

Our ongoing projects include:

- Provide food for families in crisis and ongoing need
- Maintain a wide selection of free clothing for clients to access
- Provide vouchers for assistance with utility bills
- Arrange and finance transportation to medical appointments
- ...And much more

In 2016, 8,647 families or 21,543 individuals were served. Items purchased by the Center include clothing, groceries, kid friendly groceries, personal care items, heaters, fans and blankets. Forty four homeless were assisted. The Center is funded completely by charitable donations provided by individuals, churches and local businesses.

Our CCTV Grocery Bag drive netted 2,746 pounds in 2016, a 68% increase over 2015. The holiday turkey program provided 243 turkeys for clients residing in Monroe County.
